This chart shows which verb conjugations are the most common in the New Testament.

The figures and colors represent the number of times that verb form is found. From red meaning very common, to blue being rare. By far the most common are (not surprisingly) the 3rd person singular aorist and present tenses in the indicative mood and active voice.

The white areas of this chart are those conjugations that either don't make sense at all, that are not conjugated directly (such as the perfect subjunctive and optative in the middle and passive voice, which are periphrastic) or that never appear in the grammars and references I have consulted. The areas in purple are more interesting, I think, these are verb forms that do appear in grammars or verb tables but never appear anywhere in the New Testament.

There are limitations to this map. Firstly it doesn't include the verbal participles (there are lots of them, but they don't fit into this grid and would require another map). Secondly it is NT only, so omits other important Koine texts. And thirdly it doesn't distinguish between regular verbs and irregular verbs or between first and second aorist verbs. This may skew the usefulness of the map as a study-guide for low-numbered cells.
